

Voting Equipment Report May 8, 2018 Election

In November 2005, the Logan County Board of Elections purchased forty-six (46) M-100 optical scanners with ballot bins and twenty-eight (28) AutoMark marking devices. In July 2007, the Board of Elections four (4) additional M-100 optical scanners and two (2) additional ballot bins. The total inventory of election equipment is fifty (50) M-100 optical scanners, forty-eight (48) ballot bins and twenty-eight (28) AutoMark marking devices.

For the May 8, 2018 Primary Election, the Logan County Board of Elections will be using forty-four (44) of the optical scanners, and twenty (20) AutoMark devices.

The Secretary of State has recommended one (1) optical scanner be assigned for each precinct. The Logan County Board of Elections has assigned one (1) optical scanner to each precinct (representing thirty-six (36) optical scanners), four (4) optical scanners have been assigned for absentee voting, one (1) optical scanner has been assigned for provisional ballots, and three (3) optical scanners will be used as backup/replacement scanners. Should additional scanners be needed for the backup/replacement, six (6) additional scanners can be utilized from storage. These assignments meet the recommendations of the Secretary of State.

The Secretary of State has recommended one (1) AutoMark marking device be assigned for each precinct. The Logan County Board of Elections has assigned one (1) AutoMark marking device to each polling location (representing sixteen (16) AutoMarks), one (1) has been assigned for absentee voting, and three (3) AutoMark devices will be used as backup/replacement devices. These assignments are deviations from the recommendations of the Secretary of State, however the Logan County Board of Elections has analyzed the use of the AutoMark devices from previous elections and taken into consideration feedback from precinct election officials as to how many voters actually utilize the AutoMark on Election Day. Due to the minimal use of the AutoMark on Election Day, it is the conclusion of the Board of Elections that it is not necessary to allocate an AutoMark to every precinct.

The total number registered voters in Logan County is 31,372. The attached list consists of all precincts along with the number of registered voters in each precinct and the voter turnout for a like elections (May 6, 2014 Election):
